

Early Academic Results Are Encouraging


SBAC Performance

For the second year in a row, Black, Latinx, and low-income students in charter public schools outperformed their traditional public school peers in all tested subjects (ELA, Math, and Science).

Academic Recovery

Charter public school students are returning to pre-COVID levels of achievement more quickly than their traditional public school peers.

Charter Public Schools Are Not Funded Equitably

Students deserve long-term equitable funding

Washington state charter public school students **receive \$0.75 for every dollar spent** on students at traditional public schools



Charter schools are not entitled to local property tax levies and lack access to dedicated funding for facilities. As a result, **charter public school students receive 25% less public funding** than their peers in traditional public schools, on average.

Given that charter public schools enroll disproportionately more systemically underserved students, the gap in per-pupil funding between charter and district schools perpetuates systemic inequity and means substantially less funding for children who need that funding the most.
